"At the moment, I'm pretty mobile, but in time to come, I probably won't be," Jim said.

Through his home care package and with the help of his case manager, Bobbie, Jim has been able to have a range of mobility and safety aids fitted to his home.

Jim said that CatholicCare's Occupational Therapist, Callum, is even working toward having a home access ramp installed for them.

Occupational Therapist fees and all of Jim's mobility aids are fully funded by his home care package.

"We get the cleaning done too," Dawn added, giving another example of the other Catholic Care services that they receive.

Jim's daughter, Kay, is also a big advocate for the home care package program and the benefits associated with having a CatholicCare case manager.

"I would encourage someone [to access the help] without hesitation," Kay said.

Quite often, seniors and their families don't know what services and supports, like home care packages, are available to them.

"We didn't know either until Dad was put into hospital a few times in one year," Kay said.

"One beautiful geriatric nurse said to us one day when my brothers and I were there: 'I think you should go down this road and try this...

"You don't necessarily look for it until you know you need it."

Dawn explained that her and Jim's home care packages have also helped Kay by giving her the peace of mind that her father and aunt are receiving the quality care that they deserve.

"If she goes away, she hasn't got a concern because she knows her father is being well looked after," Dawn said.

Jim, Dawn and Kay all recognise that a big part of the quality care they receive is because of their dedicated CatholicCare case manager, Bobbie. Dawn put it simply by saying that Bobbie "is excellent".

"We think Bobbie is the right person at the right job. She's made a big difference," Kay added.

"Her manner, well, it's second to none really. She speaks clearly, is loud and easily understood. She's got a heart for people who are older than she is, much older.

"She passes that on in the way she treats others.

"She is very passionate about what she does."

Kay said that having Bobbie in their lives has taken a lot of weight from her own shoulders, with Bobbie understanding that older people need face-to-face connection and personable one-on-one support.

"We're very happy too" Dawn said, "When Kay goes away Bobbie always makes sure that she organises someone to come and check on us.

"If I'm out or Kay is away, we've always got someone to rely on.

"[Bobbie] has been a tower of strength."

You will need...

- Sewing machine
- Needle and thread
- Fabric (any size, any shape, any kind)
- Trim (optional)
- Fluff or stuffing or filling, whatever suits your fancy
- Dressmaker pins (any basic sewing pins)
- Scissors

- 1. Cut two squares of the same size. Any size you would like, just be sure you have enough material to make two pieces.
- 2. If you want your cushion to be fancy, or funky, or wild, you might want to add some trim. Your trim needs to be at least the same length as all the sides of your cushion design.
- 3. Pin the seams. Decide which side is the back and which side is the front on both pieces. Put the fronts together, front to front, matching up the edges. Lay your fabric out on a flat surface. Pin along the edges. It's recommended to put a pin every 2 inches, but you can use more or less, depending on how comfortable you are at sewing. If you don't have a lot of experience, the more pins, the better. When you pin the last edge, leave about half unpinned. This is so you can stuff your pillow after you sew it.
- 4. Sew the edges of your cushion. Make sure to use a color of thread similar to the color of your fabric. If you use a sewing machine, use a zig zag stitch, but a straight stitch will work
- 5. Stuff your cushion and sew up the open edge.
- 6. ENJOY!
